

Vandalism halts grass cutting

Grass cutting could stop whilst staff put right damage caused in our parks. Mindless vandalism is now a daily occurrence in the Town's parks, particularly in Saltash Road Recreation Ground over the recent weeks. Town Council staff, who should be busy attending to the grass cutting and grounds maintenance works at this time of year, are being pulled off their very busy schedule every day to put right, and make safe, this mindless damage.



Recently, rails from the post and rail fence around the skate park have been pulled out and have been found in a nearby tree, gates have been torn from their hinges and a section of the Cornish bank has been demolished leaving an open gap onto a 15 foot drop down to the main A388. CCTV is in operation in this area and the matter has been reported to the Police. Callington Town Council will not tolerate vandalism in the Town's open spaces.

If you notice anyone causing damage in our parks please report it so we can put an end to this.

CALLINGTON U3A

Mike Hayward gave a very interesting talk for the May meeting. He began by asking whether the stories we know about the Mayflower are myth or reality. It seems mainly myth, and he enlightened us with the reality. The very first settlers to America did not sail on the Mayflower, but earlier, when in 1607 a ship sailed from London to Virginia. It was a time of religious unrest and people were being tortured and even killed for their beliefs. A group of separatists escaped the persecution by moving first to Holland, and then in 1620 they decided to emigrate to America on board the 'Speedwell' They were joined in Southampton by a second group on the 'Mayflower'. The 'Speedwell' was considered unseaworthy and both boats returned to Plymouth. The 'Mayflower' measuring only 80ft x 24ft about the size of the town hall, took on board some of the 'Speedwell' passengers and then set sail for Virginia. There were 102 passengers +30 crew, together with their animals, and all they would need for their first year in the new world. They met heavy seas, sometimes too rough for any sail, and finally after two months at sea found calm anchorage near Cape Cod. After the ordeal of the journey they decided to stay there rather than sail on to Jamestown, Virginia, and gradually dispersed to colonise that area with the help of the native Indians. Only 5 of the 18 women aboard survived + 50 men and children.

A Cornishman from St Endellion was the first survivor to have a family there. One of the other survivors who was almost drowned when he fell over board went on to have 10 children and 88 grandchildren. His descendants included Presidents Roosevelt and Bush. His brother who joined him later, was a descendant of Winston Churchill. How would history have changed had he not been saved? It is estimated that there are now 10 million living descendants of these hardy folk.

Mike's talk was vibrantly illustrated by some of his excellent paintings of the 'Mayflower' in stormy seascapes.

U3A JUNE MEETING

Tortoises and Delinquents

Our speaker for June – The Reverend Martin Smith – came with a special guest in a large cardboard box. In the cardboard box was Ollie, who has been a member of Martin's family for nearly 50 years. She (as you will see later, Oliver had been misnamed!) was purchased in the 60s from a pet shop in Stoke on Trent for the grand sum of 10 shillings as a birthday present for his sister Catherine. His opening remarks that he was not a tortoise expert seemed at odds with the fascinating and interesting talk that followed.

We learnt that the top of her shell is the carapace and if you count the rings on one of the segments, it should tell you how old she is – a bit like a tree! The under shell is the plastron and the part that links them together is the bridge. We also discovered they are not the most intelligent of creatures and have poor hearing. However, they have brilliant eyesight and sense of smell - as for taste Ollie knows what she likes: cooked cauliflower and broccoli, dandelions, clover and lettuce. They do not have teeth just a hard ridge in their jaws, so no chance of a nasty nip!

As cold blooded reptiles, temperature affects tortoises and (like most of us) they love the warmth of the sun. If Ollie is cold, she has difficulty eating and digesting food. Martin puts her in a frost free garage to hibernate from October to March, wondering if she has eaten enough to get through the winter.

Martin told the tale of a male tortoise who once came to stay and chased poor Ollie around the garden; eventually she produced an egg which solved her sex conclusively. We were shown the egg and then Ollie made her U3A debut as she was introduced to us all. Martin explained tortoises are easy to look after but you need a 'tortoise proof' garden as they will investigate everything and can move faster than you think - up to 5mph! Luckily though, tortoises can't be smelt by dogs or foxes so are fairly safe. There was a tortoise at Powderham Castle who lived to be 100, so here's hoping Ollie has such a long life.

Later, Martin shared some photos of himself and his pupils when he was a teacher in a very demanding job at Marland School. He taught teenage boys with behavioural and emotional problems. Although he was able to help some, others were to go back to their old ways when they left. He told us of Robert who used to be a pyromaniac but was very clever with clay and mathematics and went on to do a geology degree at University. At the other end of the scale was Nathan who ended up in Exeter prison for armed robbery. He read us a poem by Danny, written in his last term called 'Help' which we found very moving. Martin told us how he would reward good behaviour with off-road driving and motorbike rides! He learnt that all you can do in life is to do your best, if they reject help then it is up to them.

CALLINGTON NEW OUTLOOK

The self-styled 'best kept secret in Callington' has just celebrated its 30th anniversary – with three large birthday cakes and a public display in the town's largest supermarket. Members of Callington New Outlook social club were promoting the club in Tesco's foyer to raise awareness of its existence and displaying one of the cakes donated by the supermarket. Club Chairman Shirley Morse said: "For those in the know, New Outlook has long provided a couple of hours a week in congenial company with the chance to make new friends.

"The club meets every Tuesday morning, usually in the Town Hall Council Chamber, and has a membership of about 40 men and women. Each week throughout the year the club hears speakers on various subjects or visits places of interest, plays skittles or goes ten-pin bowling. On the first Tuesday of the month we go to a local hostelry for lunch."

Members have taken part in every Callington Carnival since it began and last year constructed a giant head, named Merlin, which has taken part in two Callington Mayfest parades and one carnival. Preparations for the club's entry in this year's carnival are under way, and a BBQ is well in the planning stage.




